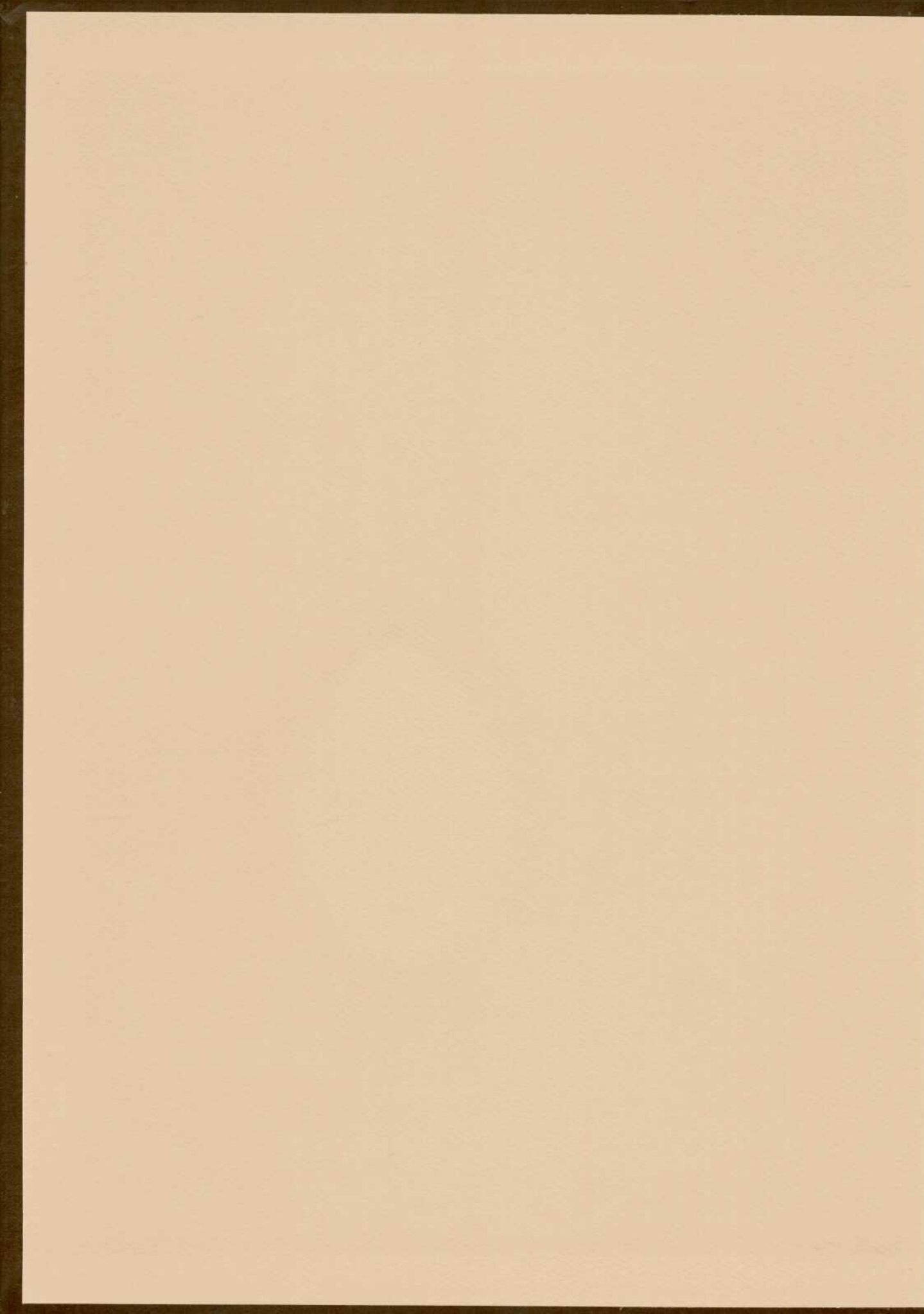

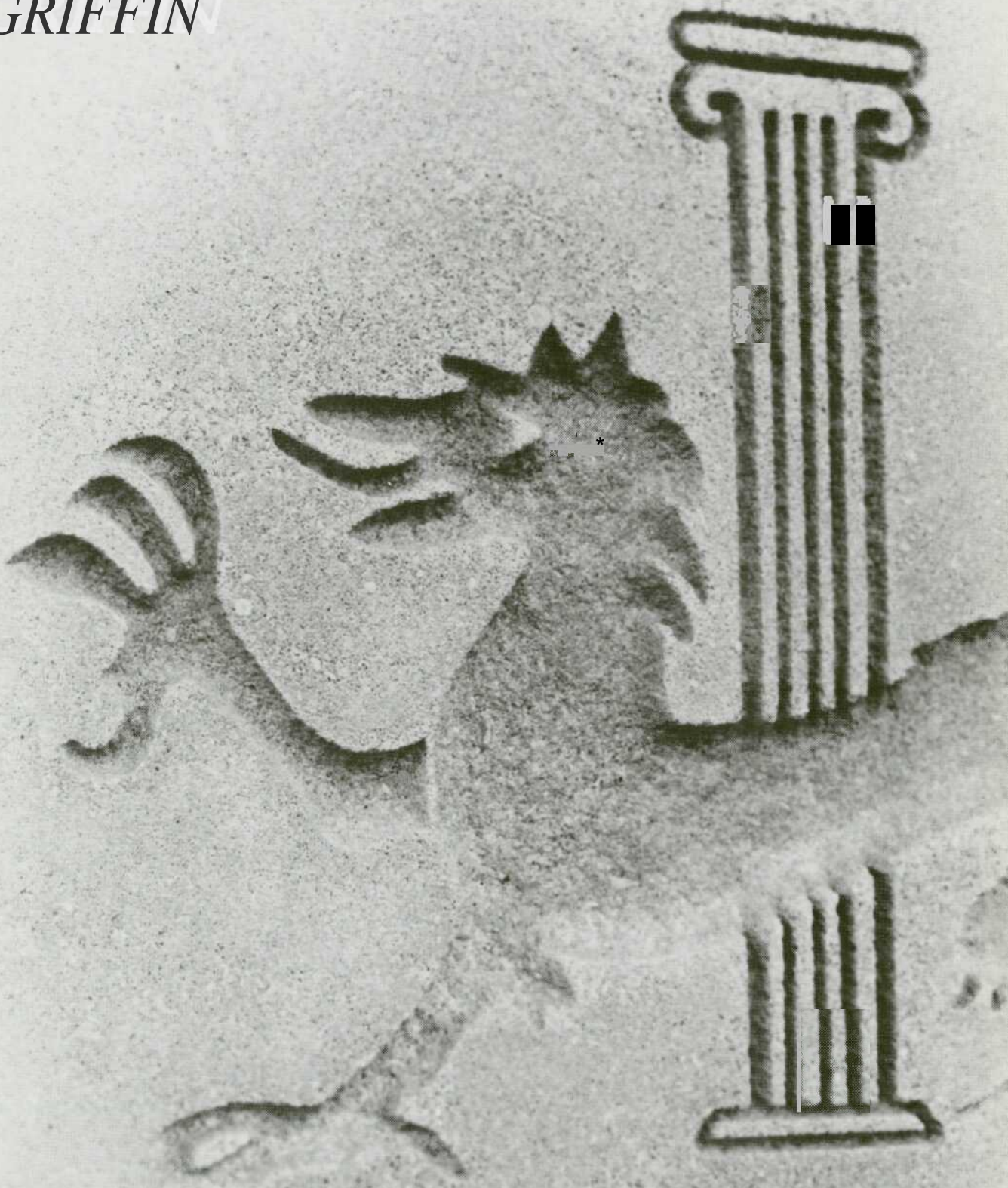
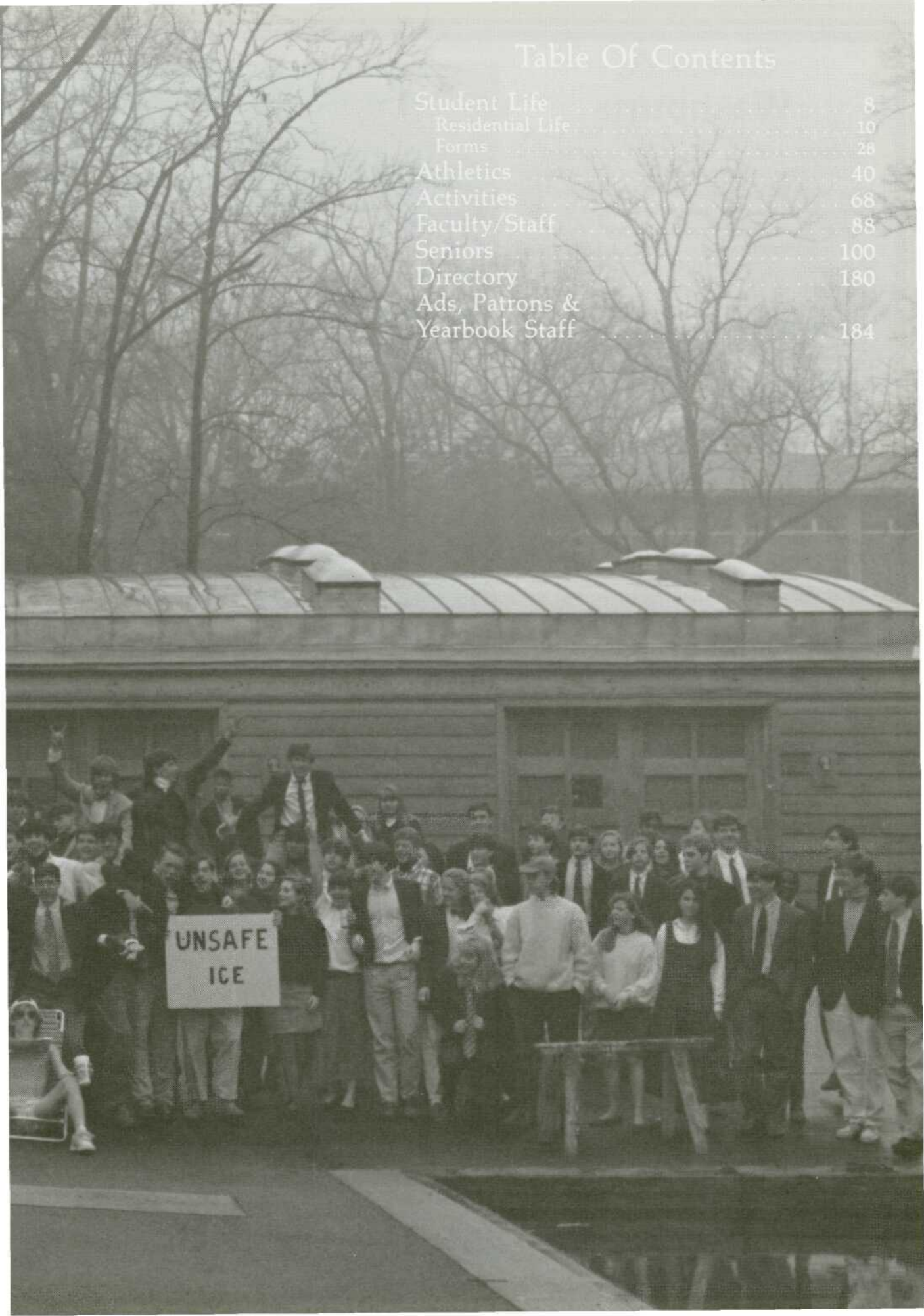




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Davis A. Washburn

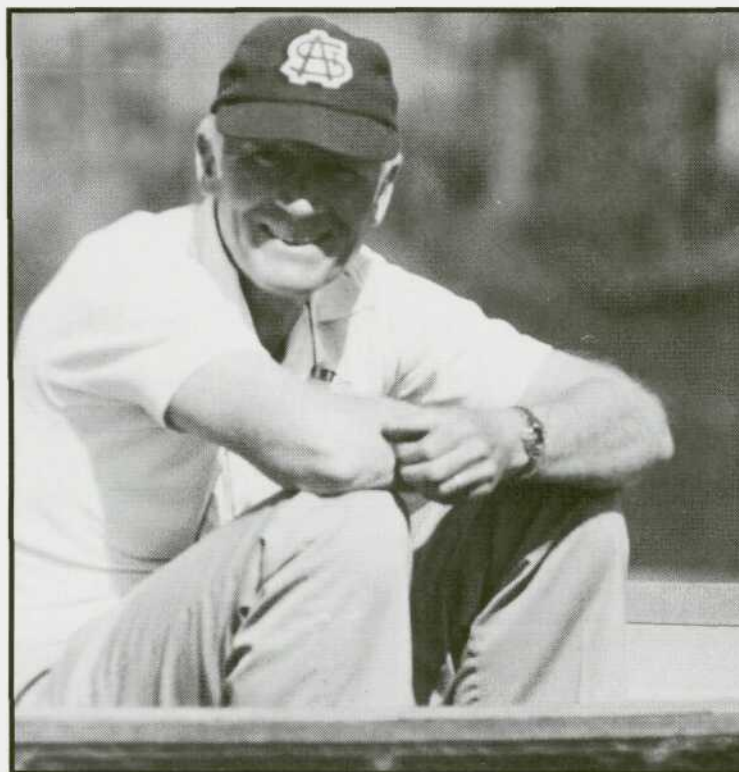
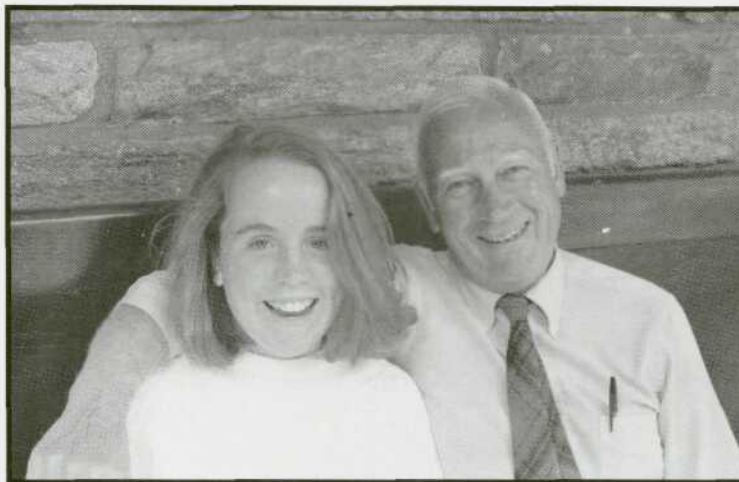
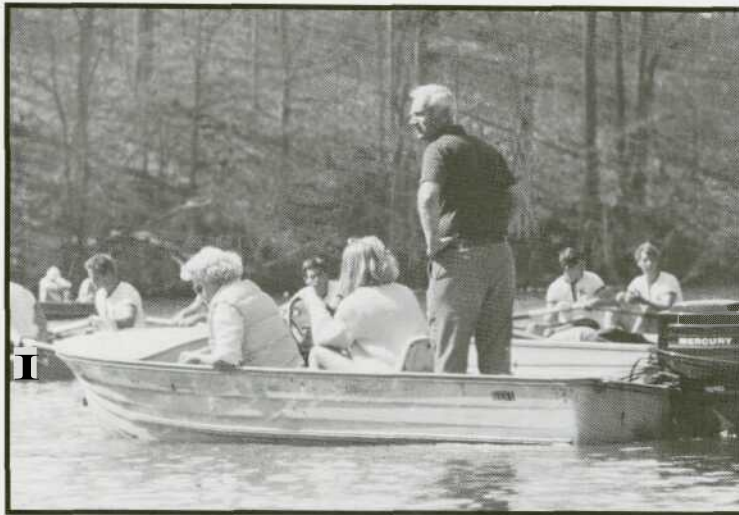
After forty years of service, Mr. Davis Washburn and his wife, Ellie, have decided that it is time to leave St. Andrew's. During his time here, Mr. Washburn has contributed his skills as a teacher, coach, secretary to the alumni association, corridor master, and perhaps most importantly, as a friend. Let us take a moment to look back at his career and appreciate all he has done.

Mr. Washburn first came to SAS as a student in 1944. After finishing his senior year, he enrolled in the Navy's V-12 program, through which he attended Penn and graduated from Swarthmore. He then taught at Mercersburg Academy for four years before responding to the call of his Alma Mater in 1951 to teach math and coach Men's Varsity Basketball, Football and Crew. As a coach, Mr. Washburn expected the best from his men, illustrated by his teams' outstanding records.

Although he has coached many sports, Mr. Washburn will be remembered for being *the* Varsity Men's Crew coach of SAS. He began his illustrious coaching career as the Men's Club Crew coach, but he soon replaced Coerte Voorhees as the Men's Varsity coach. He led four crews to the Henley Regatta in England, and has made the St. Andrew's Men's Crew a known force among the many East Coast crews. In the spring, "Ducky" can always be found on the water motoring alongside his rowers, pointing out every flaw, leading the pre-practice stretches, or urging on all his men with shouts like "Let's beat Kent Crew!" There are many places at St. Andrew's that Mr. Washburn will be missed, yet his absence will be felt most deeply next spring as rowers assemble in Washburn Cove to lower their shells into the waters of Noxontown Pond.

During his time here, Mr. Washburn has touched many lives in many ways. His unusual coaching and teaching habits will be remembered by all. As echoes of "TILT!" resound in the math corridor, we will think of Mr. Washburn and smile.

In recognition of his extraordinary devotion to St. Andrew's, the Class of 1991 dedicates this yearbook to Davis A. Washburn.





Alexander Ogilby

This spring brings to a close the diverse career of the Reverend Alexander Ogilby at St. Andrew's. Having been a master at Groton and a chaplain at Pomfret, Mr. Ogilby brought a great deal of experience when he began his 24 years as chaplain, teacher, corridor master, coach, and friend in 1959.

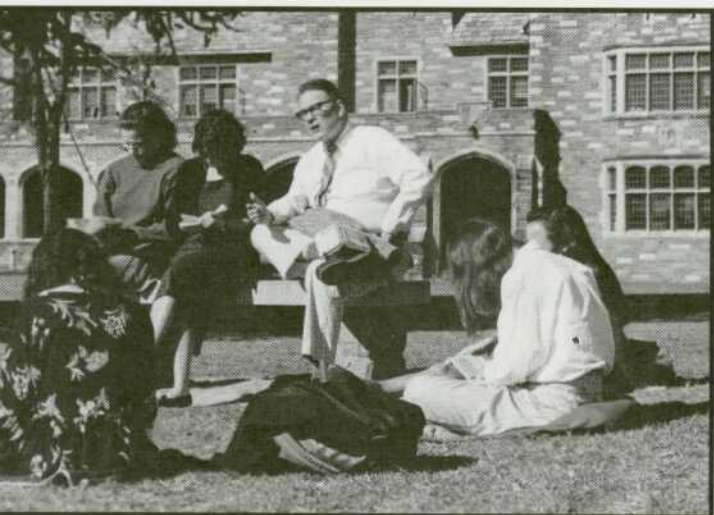
It is said Mr. Ogilby's classes resonate with a message even the Old Testament prophets would be eager to hear. His knowledge of philosophy and theology is vast and profound, and he works diligently to extract the deepest thoughts and insights from his students.

Mr. Ogilby was a stern and demanding football coach with the "Senior Eleven" program. Mr. Ogilby coached J.V. baseball for 24 years, winning 134 games and posting a .547 winning percentage. In 1976, he also helped coach the varsity team to a 14-4 record (the best in the history of the school). Although there was humor in Mr. Ogilby's practices, one didn't dare fail to tag up at third on a fly ball for fear the wrath of AO (close to that of God) would come tumbling down. Opposing coaches suspected he used Divine Interpretation, for he always managed to get an umpire to see his way.

For many years, Mr. Ogilby lived in Sherwood Corridor, keeping a watchful eye on his residents. Having high expectations for his seniors, Mr. Ogilby seemed to have an unstated understanding with his students as he kept the law and order.

Chaplain, teacher, corridor master, coach, and friend from 1959 to 1991, Mr. Ogilby gave St. Andrew's thirty-two years of humble and devoted service. He blessed us with sincerity and cheered us with gusto. He encouraged us in the classroom and on the baseball field. Most of all, he shared with us his genuine love for The Church and Bible, opening our minds and hearts in the pursuit of "Faith and Learning" — *pistiskai episteme*.

In recognition of his extraordinary devotion to St. Andrew's, the Class of 1991 dedicates this yearbook to Alexander Ogilby.



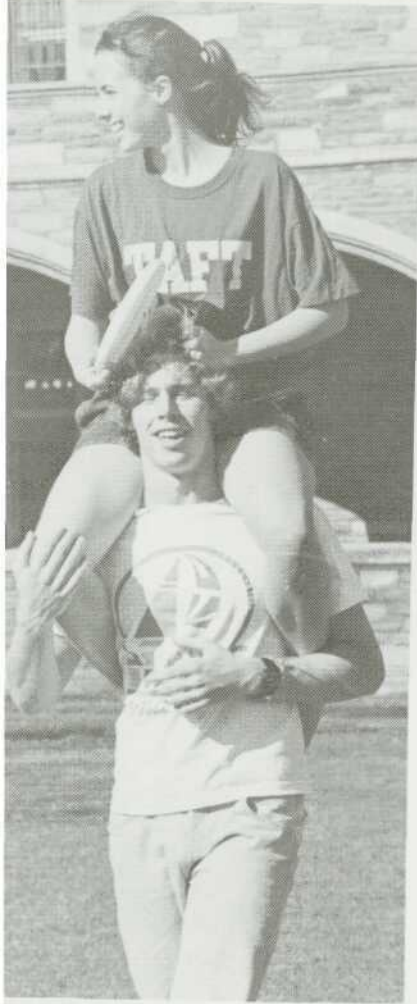

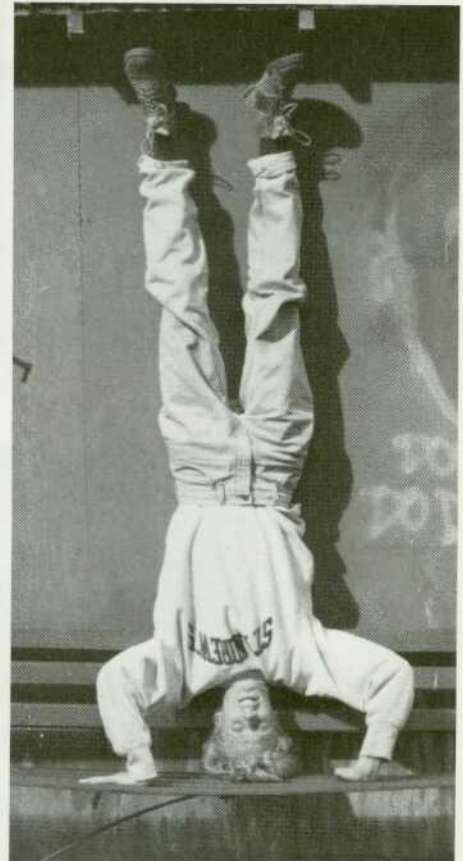
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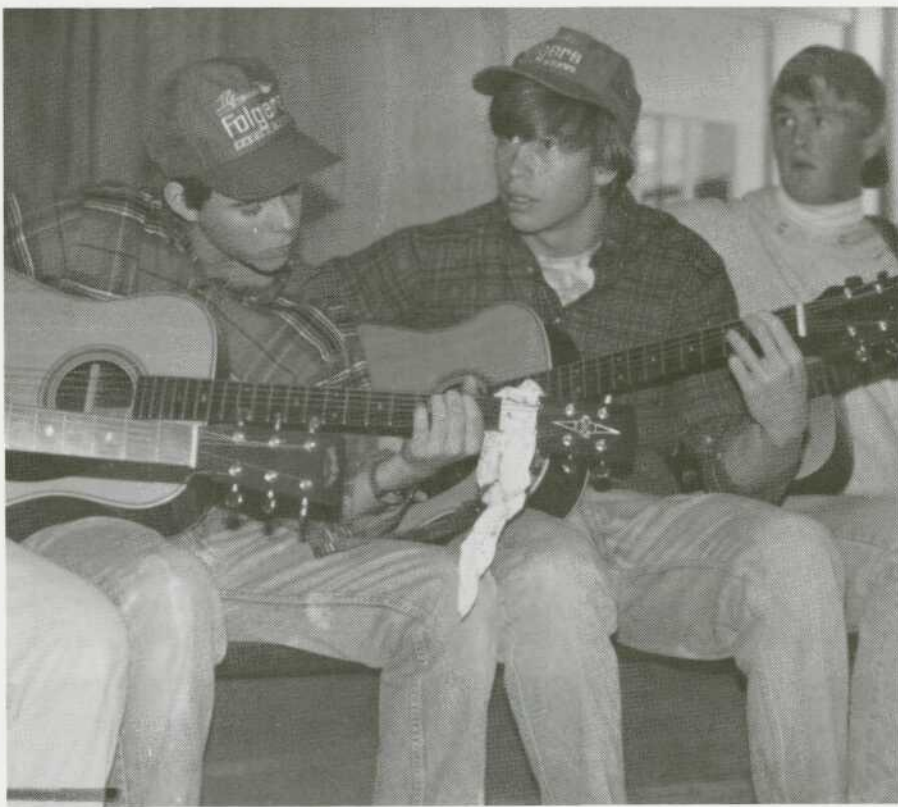
The Shack

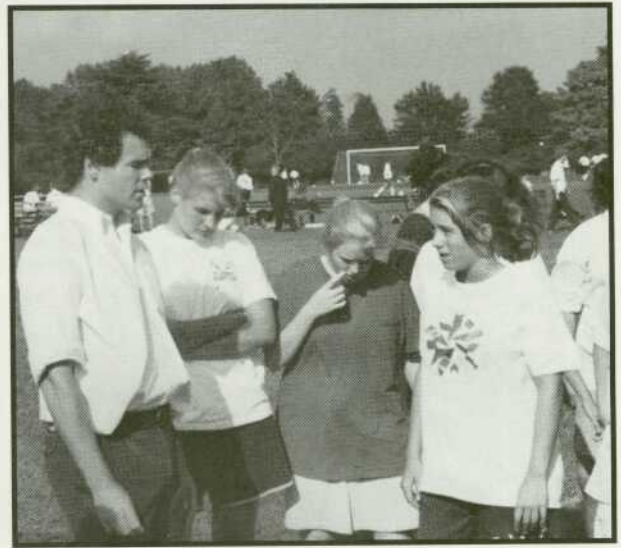
The cross-country team is seen by all, running loop after loop. Occasionally, one might catch a glimpse of the volleyball team actu-

Fall at SAS is a great sport season for spectators and players alike.

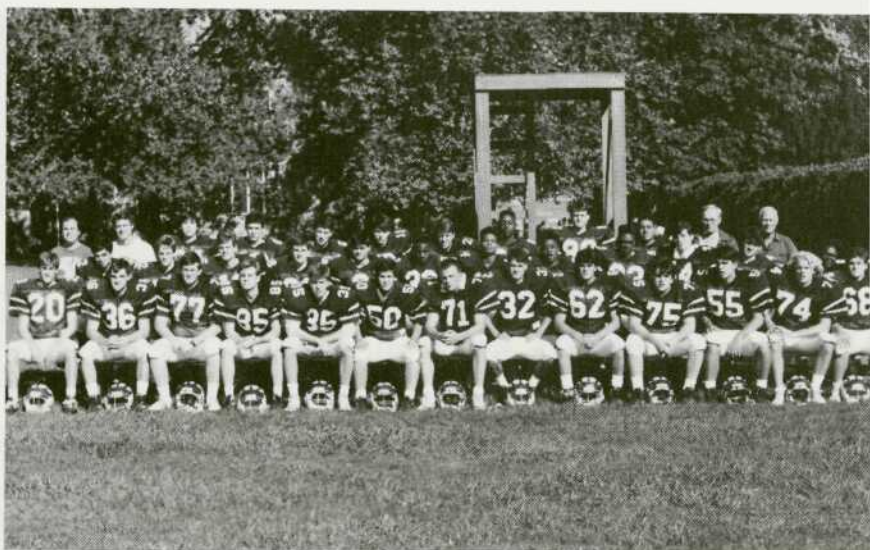

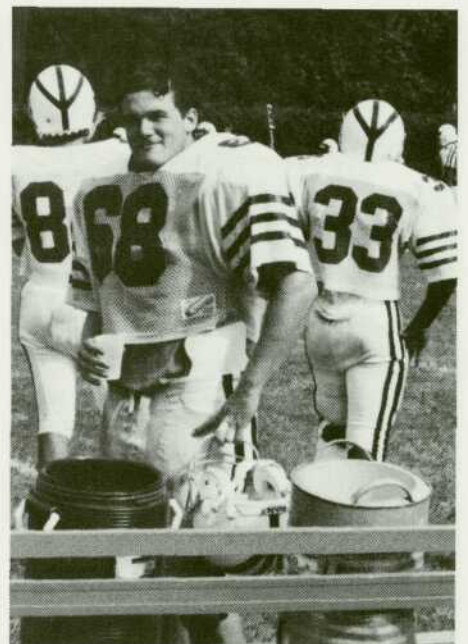

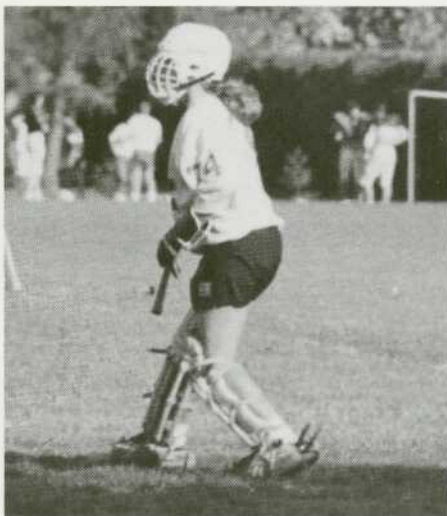

Men's Cross Country

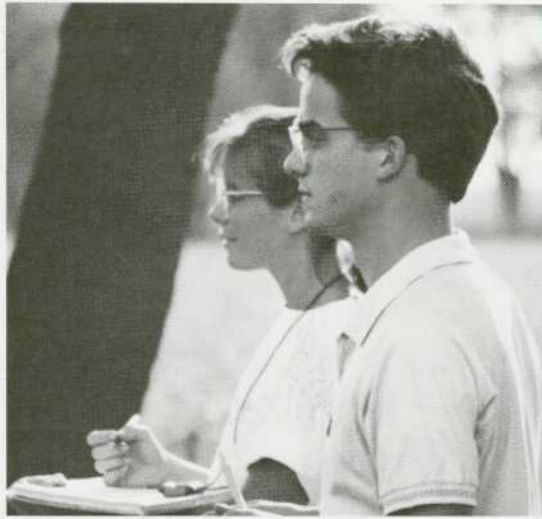

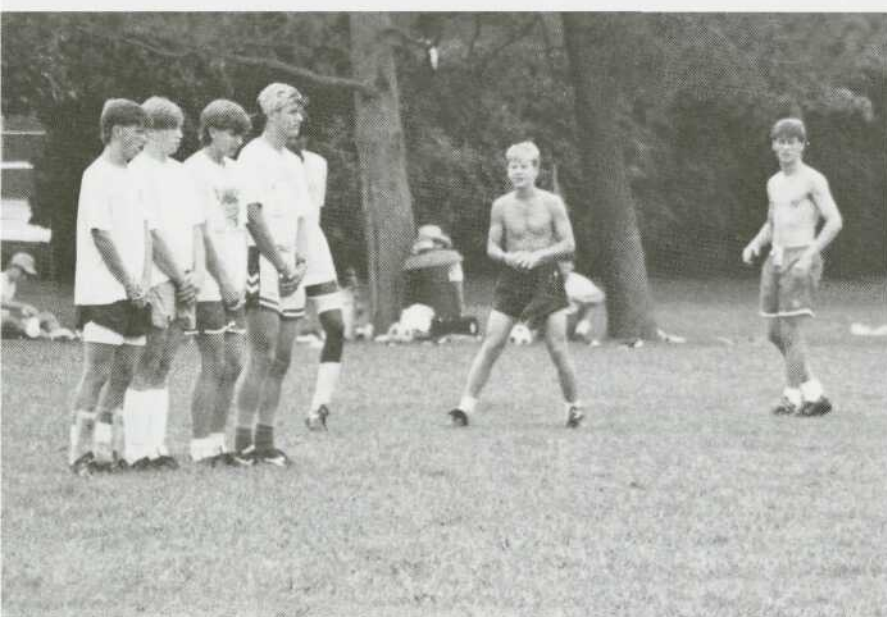
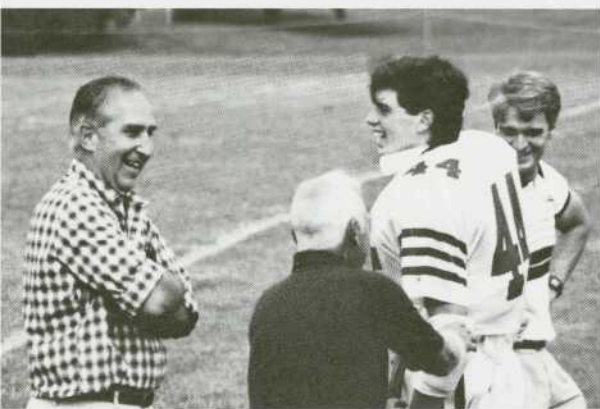
WOMEN'S SOCCER

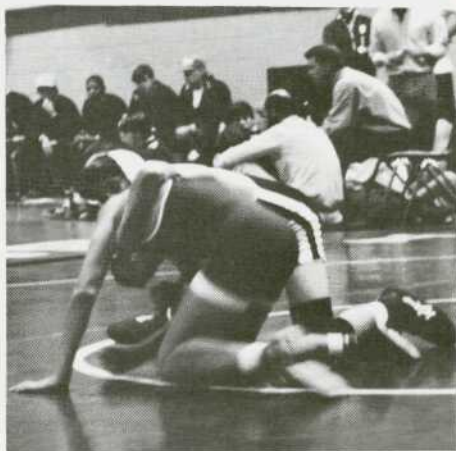
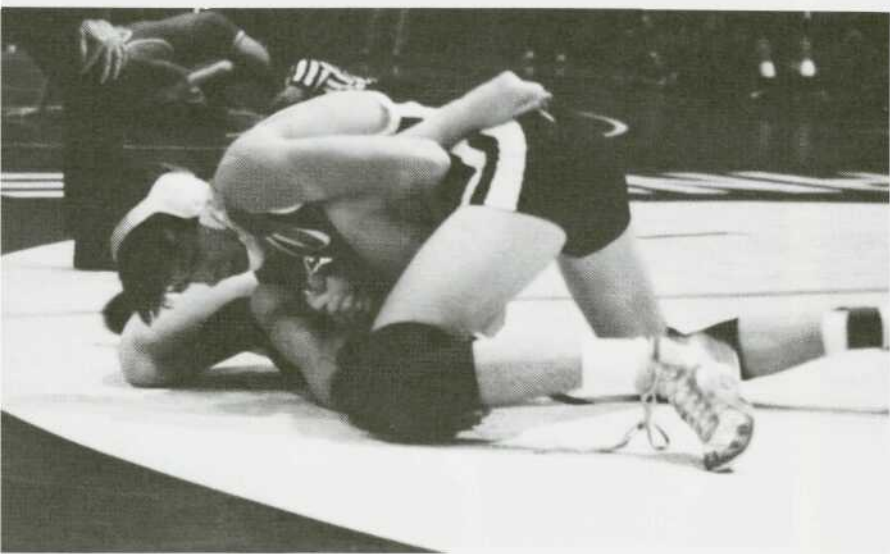
Wrestling

At the Hardcastle's Hastings meets up with his mistress, Constance (Mary Neidig). He discovers the truth about the house, but decides to keep Marlow in the dark. Trickery and deception cause much sitting room chaos as Mr. Hardcastle gets exasperated with Marlow's impudent behavior and Kate disguises herself as a barmaid to capture Marlow's attention. Meanwhile, Tony helps Hastings and Constance in their elopement.

The turmoil in the play comes to a head when Marlow discovers all the ways he has been tricked. He attempts to flee the house, but is detained by Mr. Hardcastle and Lady Marlow (Claudine Wiley). The play ends happily with both Marlow and Kate, and Hastings and Constance together. And, as the play ended, so did a whole term of practices and rehearsals. Everyone worked together, giving their best performances for a satisfying "theater run." Anything Goes

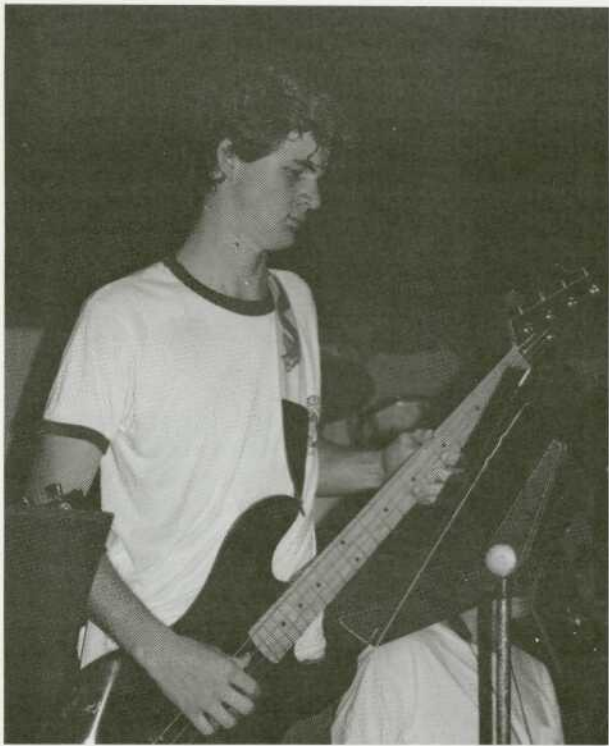

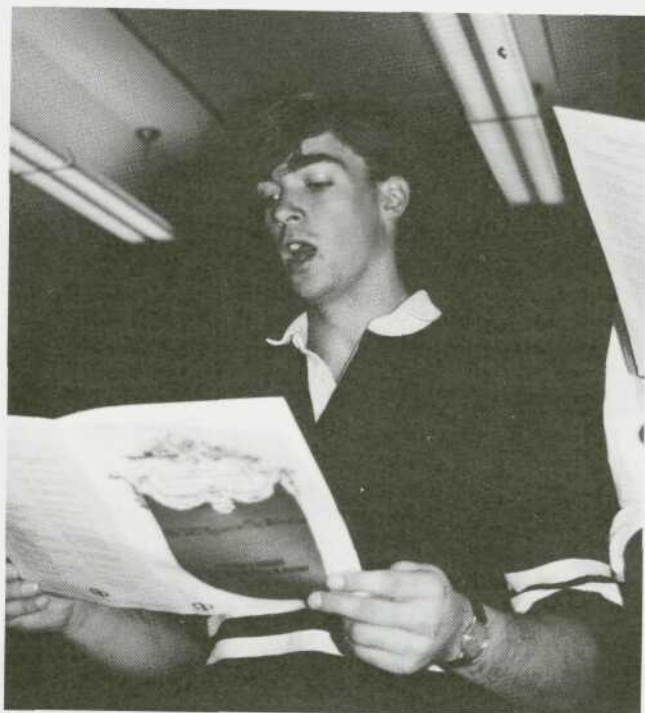
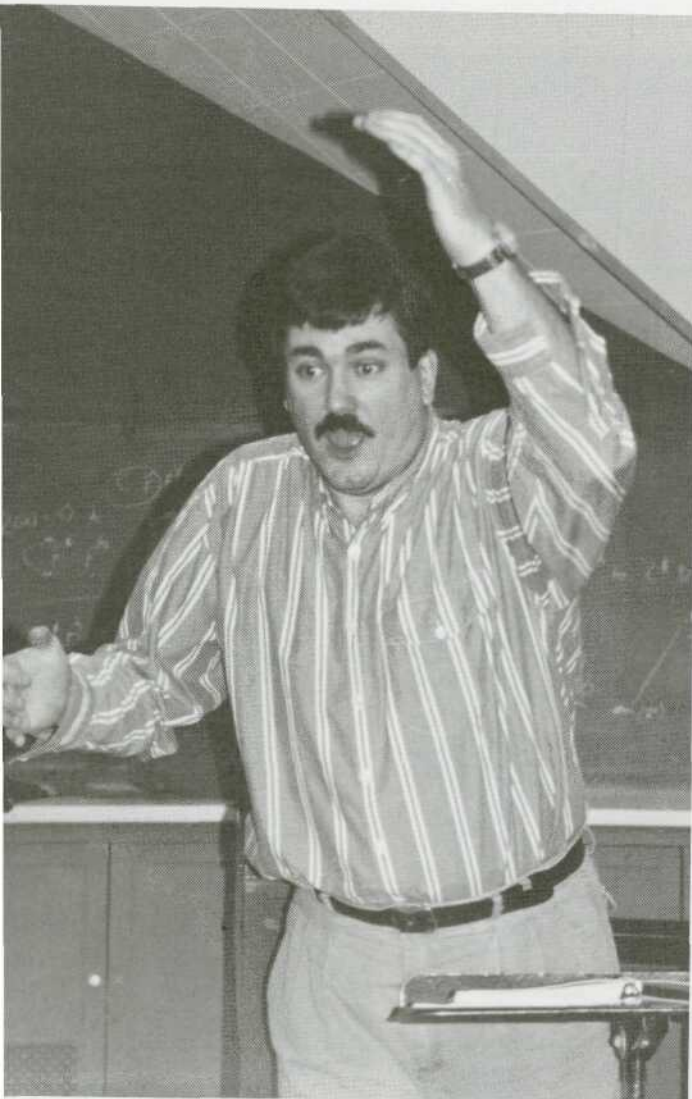

When the service begins the sacristans melt into the congregation or the choir; the lectors assume their positions at the pulpit when it is time to read the lessons, and the acolytes perform their tasks of leading the procession and recession, assisting the communion officiant prepare the sacraments, and administering and collecting the offertory plates from the monitors. After the service, the sacristans reappear to take down the hymn numbers and put away the communion vessels, and Kevin takes the collection to be deposited in the Vestry account. Members of the chapel organizations do much more than read the lessons or light the candles; they are the backbone of the chapel program here at St. Andrew's. Kelly Hoopes, David Rich, and Laura Shaffer would like to thank all of you who made their jobs as heads of these organizations easier by your involvement in the chapel program. 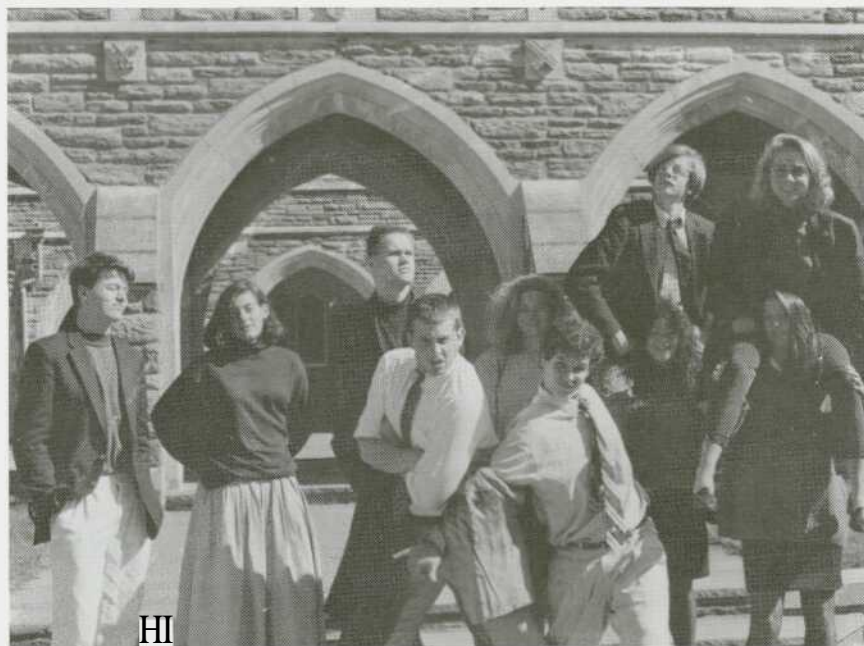
S.A.C.

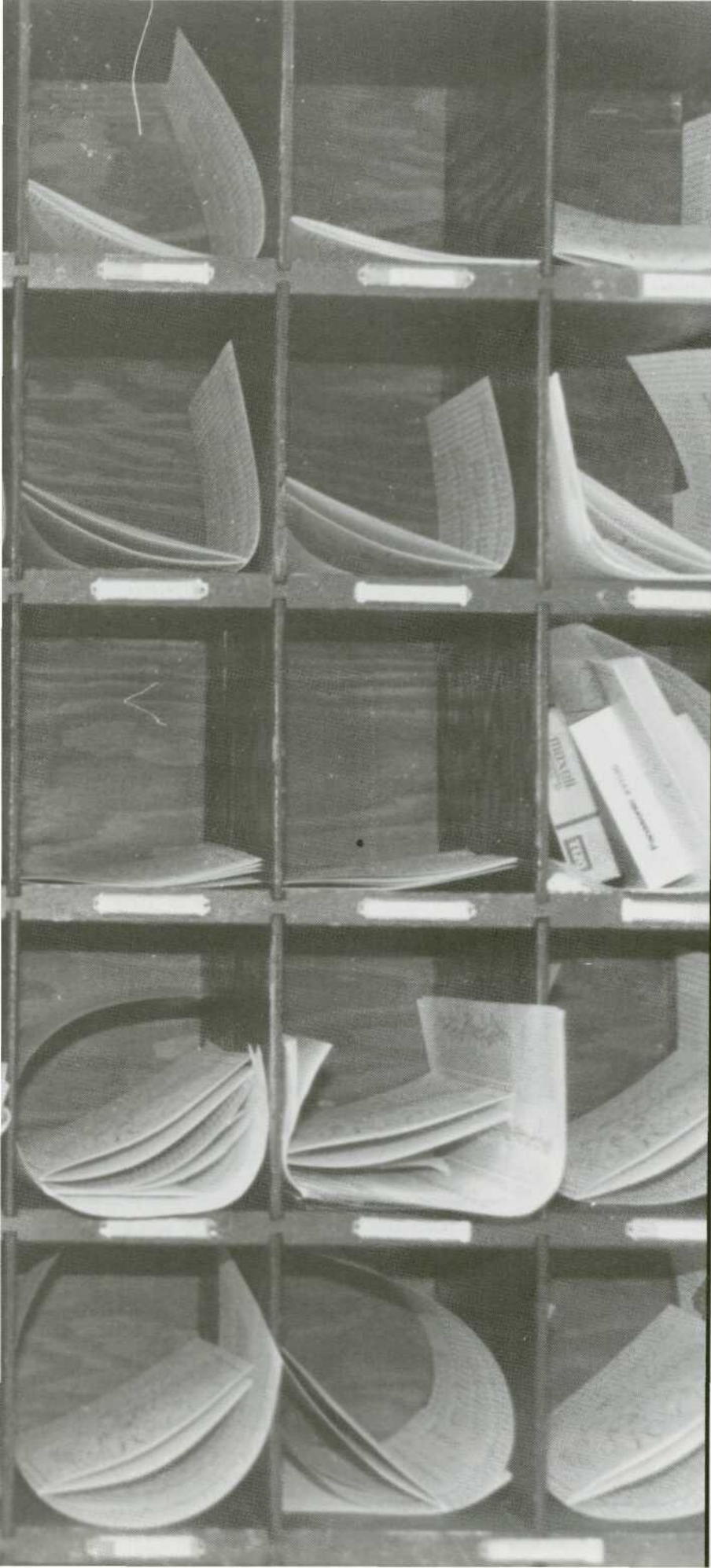
Andrean
