

MEMORIAL SERVICE TO BE HELD

At 11:15 tomorrow morning, the service of Holy Communion will be celebrated in memory of those St. Andreans who have died both in Peacetime and in the service of their country during the last war. Dr. Walden Pell II will deliver a sermon commemorating two St. Andreans deceased since the Alumni Weekend of last year.

George Welch, SAS class of 1937, died on October 12th, 1954, in the explosion of the Sabrejet he was testing for North American Aviation Company. During World War II, he shot down four Japanese airplanes at Pearl Harbor, and was one of the first merican Aces of that war.

Mr. James Craik Morris Jr., who died on May 5th, 1954, had long been associated with St. Andrew's School. He was a member of the faculty from 1936 to 1954, Teacher of Art from 1936 to 1953, Teacher of English from 1941 to 1954, Organist from 1943to 1954, and Choirmaster from 1952 to 1954. His loss to the school was immense, and anyone who has ever had anything to do with St. Andrew's School was deeply saddened by the news of the death of this truly great *******

FOR NEW WING.

On Friday, May 6, ground was broken for the new Wing, to be built over the space now occupied by the auditorium.

Doctor Pell officiated at the ceremony, held at three o'clock outside the Auditorium. Present were members of the Board of Trustees, and representatives of the firm of William Heyl Thompsom, who, with his associate, William W. Grangell, once connected with the School's ofiginal archatect, Arthur H. Brockie, has already prepared working blue-

The contract for the construction of the new wing has been awarded to the Turner Construction Company, the builders of most of the original buildings around School, who are scheduled to begin work on Monday, May 16.

This new addition will add fifty percent to the area of the School and will provide living quarters for fifty-six roys. It will also contain the new library, the remodeled auditorium, four new classrooms, and two faculty apartments.
