SAS SCORES CLEAN SWEEP

Today the first eight overwhelmed the University of Pennsylvania Second 150-pound Freshmen eight here in about 5:40, breaking the course record. St. Andrew's eight—Jack Dubois, bow; Bill Cox, two; Reynolds LeBus, three; Sidney Dickson, four; John Gregory, five; Dick Spencer, six; J. B. Quillin, seven; Duke Winters, stroke; and Mike Quillin, coxswain—crossed the finish line four lengths ahead of their opponents, who rowed a six-minute mile.

This afternoon, the St. Andrew's baseball team crushed Westtown Friends, 11-4, in a game played before a crowd of enthusiastic SAS alumni. Billy Russell, who last weekend pitched a two-hitter against Bidwell Friends, struck out three batters; Tommy O'Rourke and George Lodoen had big days at bat, O'Rourke slugging a homerun, a triple, and betting in five runs, and Lodoen knocking a long triple.

MEMORIAL SERVICE TO BE HELD

At 11:15 tomorrow morning, the service of Holy Communion will be celebrated in memory of those St. Andreans who have died both in Peacetime and in the service of their country during the last war. Dr. Walden Pell II will deliver a sermon commemorating two St. Andreans deceased since the Alumni Weekend of last year.

George Welch, SAS class of 1937, died on October 12th, 1954, in the explosion of the Sabrojet he was testing for North American Aviation Company. During World War II, he shot down four Japanese airplanes at Pearl Harbor, and was one of the first American Aces of that war.

Mr. James Craik Morris Jr., who died on May 5th, 1954, had long been associated with St. Andrew's School. He was a member of the faculty from 1936 to 1954, Teacher of Art from 1936 to 1953, Teacher of English from 1941 to 1954, Organist from 1943 to 1954, and Choirmaster from 1952 to 1954. His loss to the school was immense, and anyone who has ever had anything to do with St. Andrew's School was deeply saddened by the news of the death of this truly great man.

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EDITORIAL

The matter of cumulative five weeks grades has come up so often in the past few days that we feel it worthy of mention here. We of the Saint staff feel that it would be easier to reset a set of five weeks grades, the reasons being: 1.) That masters will have to figure out a set of five weeks' grades anyhow; 2.) Boys can determine approximately their own cumulative grades if given the five weeks' set; and, 3.) It would help boys to know how they are doing this term. If cumulative grades were posted, all the intermediate Algebra in the world would not make it any easier for boys to figure what their five weeks' marks would have been.

Several masters have been interviewed in the past few days as to what their opinions were on the subject of cumulative versus non-cumulative grades. Some said that they would be in favor of non-cumulative grades, for it would give a boy a clearer idea of what he had done so far this term, and what he had to do. On the other hand, other masters expressed the opinion that if the final grade was to be cumulative, grades throughout the entire year should be cumulative from September

On April 23, the First Varsity Eight, composed of: Dubois, bow; Cox, two; Lebus, three; DuPont, captain, four; J.D. Quillin, five; Dickson, six; Mike Hayman, seven; Lagarde, stroke; and Mike Quillin, coxswain, lost to a better Princeton Second 150-pound Freshman Crew, which grabbed a short-lived lead at the start. The boats were bow-and-bow all thru the first half, until Princeton pulled away to lead by almost three-quarters of a length at the three-quarter mile and win by a length in 5:19. St. Andrew's did the distance in 5:22, rowing a 30 stroke all the way.
