# St. Andrew's title choice

Football is big business in Middletown.
Not only do fans talk about the Cavaliers, who win as a way of life, but they also beat the drums about the Saints of St. Andrew's School.
Coach Dave Washburn of the Saints is his team's No. 1 booster. He thinks his club will win the Independent Conference championship.

AT 2 p.m. tomorrow the Saints, who tied Tatnall for the title in 1968, open conference play against Friends.
St. Andrew's has won two non-conference starts $-34-0$ over Baltimore Boy's Latin and 22-6 over Perkiomen (Pa.) Prep. Friends lost its opener to A. I. du Pont, but overpowered George School 27-14 and Baltimore Friends 46-15 in its last two starts.

The I.C: season actually gets underway this afternoon with Tower Hill host to Sanford. At 10:30 a.m. tomorrow, St. Elizabeth's is at home against Tatnall.

WE'VE had a lot of injuries," said Washburn, "But I feel that unless we have a real disaster, we will win the championship."
Washburn isn't a team egotist, claiming his team has depth size, and experience. That's why the loss at various points during the season of his No. 1 quarterback, fullback, halfback, and one of.his best linemen haven't hurt.

Scott Ross, the quarterback, missed the Perkiomen game, yielding to Dick Coleman, who started his football career as an end, was switched $t$ ohalfback because Washburn had too many ends, Coleman was tabbed No. 2 quarterback because of Andy Washburn the coach's son who was also the backup signal-caller, suffered torn ligaments and was sidelined the rest of the season.

PETE McCagg, the starting fullback, suffered an injury on the third play of the Perkiomen game and Colemen moved there, scoring all three touchdowns in his team's victory. Mark Rocha, -the No. 3 quarterback, directed the team during Colemian's heroics.
Bill Strong, who at 6-2 and 190 pounds lives up physically to his name, was hurt and played at less than peak condition against Perkiomen.
During practice this week, tackle Jim VonBrun was injured and missed practice. So did second-string fullback

Brian Kinahan, who performed brilliantly against Perkiomen when Coleman played quarterback.
"We made a vow before the season began. We wouldn't get up tight about injuriesabout people missing from the line-up during the season," said Washburn.
"FORTUNATELY, we have a spare man at every position, even though we have only 25 players currently on the roster," said Washburn.
Friends' Quakers, who lost a chance to share the 1968 title but lost to the Saints is led by the barefoot-kicking quarterback, Tom Sultzer,

and fullback Ray Osbun, who has gained over 100 yards in each of his last two seasons.
Coach Bob Tattersall admits that "St. Andrew's has everything going for them. "They'll try to wear teams down, just like they did Perkiomen.
"AS for us, we're not as explosive as those last two scores have indicated. 'We'll continue to improve, but we'll have to control the ball for us to have a successful season," said Tattersall.

Sanford (1-0-1 and Tower Hill (1-2) are small teams that will rely on finesse to triumph. Sanford has a pair of rugged linebackers - Pete England and Tom Kight who have helped their club hold two opponents scoreless. Tatnall is $0-3$ and has scored one touchdown in those three games. An all-sophomore backfield that includes Pete Veale; Blair Dickerson, Jamie Jenny and Ed Cook will improve, Says Garvin.

ST. Elizabeth's, which has won three impressively in four games, has been rated the chief threat to the Saints. Led by quarterback Tubby Dobrowalski and halfback Bob Hickey, the Vikings have shut out two Blue Hen Conference Flight B teamsHoward $10-0$ and A. I. du Pont 12-0. Gunning Bedford, another ' $B$ ' team was beaten $33-8$ and the Vikings' only loss was a 30-12 setback at Claymont.
"We've got a good attitude," said Coach John Klepacki. "That's the difference in this year's club over the '68 team that only won once."
"I think our chances of winning the title are very good. I think st's between us and St. Andrew's," said Klepacki. St. Andrew's and St. Elizabeth's meet Oct. 31 on the Viking's field.

St. Andrew's School, unbeaten in its last 14 football games, is the undisputed champion of the Independent Conference.
The Cardinals, $6-0-1$ a year ago when they shared the conference title with Tatnall, finished 7-0 this season, routing the hapless Hornets $56-0$ at Middletown Saturday. Tatnall, with its 1968 stars graduated, didn't win in eight starts this fall.
St. Andrew's 56-point spree gave the Cardinals a team scoring record of 242 points. The Cardinals led $20-0$ at halftime, then blitzed the Hornets for 36 points after intermission.
Senior halfback Bill Strong paced the Cardinals with three touchdowns, scoring on two short runs and on a 38 -yard pass from quarterback Scott Ross. Ross finished his high school career with an unusual performance - he completed only three of 12 passes, but two went for touchdowns. He also threw a 50 -yard bomb to junior end Jim Sumler
Pete McCagg, St. Andrew's junior fullback, scored twice. Another junior, John Wright, led the Cardinals in rushing with 113 yards in seven carries and scored on a 29 -yard run.
Dick Coleman intercepted two passes while McCagg and Wright picked off one apiece to keep the Tatnall offense stymied.

End Alan Sheats of Middletown High became the first posthumous All-State footbal selection today as the 22d annual Delaware All-State team was announced.
Sheats, one of four Middietown players named to the squad, was killed in an automobile accident Nov. 1.
Cavalier teammates named were backs Herky Billings and Scotty Reihm and tackle Dan Wiley.
Conrad, unbeaten as was Middletown, also had four representatives with center Don Robison, guard Mike Dougherty, tackle Paul Sekcinski and back Jim Reilly.
St. Andrew's, the state's only other undefeated team, placed end Tom Stephens on the first team. Henlopen Conference champion Smyrna was represented by lineman Bruce Morrow Milford's Bruce Watson, the state's leading scorer, completes the team.
The all-senior team, selected by the Wilmington Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association and based on personal observation and interviews with coaches and officials, includes no repearers. Sheats and Billings were second-team picks with Reihm on the third team last year.
The All-Staters will be presented plaques at the WSBA's annual banquet at the Hotel du Pont on Jan. 21, 1970.
The multi-talented Sheats was the son of Mr . and Mrs. Earl Sheats, R.D., Middletown. Even
though his tragic death came three games before Middletown ended its unbeaten season, Sheats was selected on virtually all of the ballots submitted from coaches throughout the state. A number named him the state's top lineman.
The 6 -foot-2 295 -pound Sheats also was an outstanding basketball and baseball player and was considered by many as the best all-around athlete in Delaware.
"I never coached an end as fine as Alan," said Middletown Coach Bill Billings. "He was one of the best I've seen. I don't know of any high school player who was so outstanding in three sports.?

# Reyner, 15 veferans back, St. Andrew's streak safe?

MIDDLETOWN - It was in 1967 that St. Andrew's School last lost a football game. There are 15 lettermen on this year's squad, most of whom have never known defeat in their varsity career.
Which points up the type of pressure on the Saints as they start 1970. Every one of their seven opponents are regarding them as the team they'd most like to beat. The first rival is Baltimore's St. Paul's, to be played here at $2: 15$ p.m. Saturday.

An added returnee to the Middletown school is Webb Reyner, who is back for his 13th season after taking a sabbatical last year to coach in Texas. He'll be operating on the tried "play" 'em one at a time"method.
"RIGHT now all that I'm thinking about is our first opponent," said Reyner. "That's a school that beat us 44-0 a few years ago, then dropped us off the schedule. So they look like enough to concentrate. on especially

since we've only had half the training time they've had.
"After that we get Perkiomen Prep, which always has a good team. Then we have a week off before we start Independent Conference play."
But if Reyner isn't thinking of the conference right now, his rival coaches are definite
ly thinking of St. Andrew's especially its three All-Conference selections that are back.
ONE is Peter McCagg, who combines shiftiness and strength in his running. The 6 -foot, 175 -pound co-captain should be one of the state's top ball carriers this season.
Another is Jim Sumler, a $6-4$, 190-pound end. "He's strong, has excellent hands and is a good blocker," points out Reyner. And of co-captain Tom Hooper ( $5-10,180$ ), he declares, "I haven't seen many better guards, either here or Texas."
Actually Hooper is a guardtackle in the system that the Saints use. The other is Preston Gazaway ( $5-10,180$ ), who was second team All-Conference in 1969.
THIS two will play bnth ways with the other interior duties to be shared by Bruce Valliant (6-0, 175), Brian Scripture (5-10, 170) Francis Townsend (6-1,200) and Everett McNair ( $6-0,180$ ), the latter a newcomer who has done well.
Along with Sumler at end,
there's basketball ace Sheldon Parker, who now towers $6-81 / 2$ and who weighs 220 . He's getting bigger and better all the time and seems reads to take over for the departed Tom Stephens. Jim Obst ( $5-10$, 170 ) and Dick Poole (6-1, 160) are reserves
Mark Rocha has taken over at quarterback. "He's a good runner and throws a good hard ball," says Reyner of the $6-0,175-$ pound senior. Joe Moss (5-7, 155) backs Rocha up.
The other backs are Tyrone Rice (5-10, 160) and John Wright (5-10, 155) with Brian Kinahan, (an American who lives in Switzerland) lending speed. Andy Washburn, can also be counted upon for kicking as well as running duties.
ONE of the intriguing factors is just what Texas twists Reyner may have added. He plays it coy on that one. "Let's just say we'll have the same basic approach with some Texas variations. Our team has been successíuỉ aink we aren't going to try to change what has been going
well. Still, we hope to have some new things ready for when we'll need them."
"Our main enemy has been the calender since we've only been practicing since Sept. 8 . Still our players have the right attitude. They worked out on their own before that and reported in good shape."
Dave Washburn, who coached the club to a 7-0 season last year during Reyner's absence, will serve as an assistant along with Bob Colburn, whom the head coach calls, "the best scout I've ever seen anywhere." It's a smooth, cohesive group.
And they agree on the cautious approach. "We have a good group," admits Reyner. "But I remember 13 years ago when we won our first two, everybody started talking about going all the way, and we lost every game after that. So we'll worry about each one in turn. I don't want that to happen again."
Most people don't figure that it will.

## mirror of past

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England - The Queen is dead - Victoria, I mean - but you wouldn't believe it when you walk into the Henley Royal Regatta. You expect to bump into her at any moment during tea in


QUEEN VICTORIA the Steward's Enclosure, amidst a cast that doesn't seem to have changed since Victorian time. It is a crowd that makes a Harvard-Yale gathering seem downright proletarian

To be sure there is also a public enclosure where Fagin and Oliver Twist would feel quite comfortable, with pinball machines and a juke box blaring Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young's "Love the One You're With." But in the Steward's, as the Royal Air Force baind in living, shining brass - plays waltzes, the old boy oarsmen in their moulding and shredding blazers, thinking of long ago undergraduate days, recreate the past in an elegant human tapestry

The Regatita, a fiesta of both muscle and manner, was begun in 1839 on a relatively straight stretch of the Thames that lolls through incredibly green and lovely countryside surrounding the small lown of Henley. It is a set piece from a bygone era that never returned except for four days in late June and early July when the solitude of the riverside is exchanged for a sporting garden party, Racing boats appear on the river and straw boater's appear on thousands of heads in the crowd.

Though hot pents, minis and trousers are to be seen on stunning young birds, females are predominantly uniformed in flowered frocks savored by Queen mothers and Helen Hokinson ladies. Their hats are as broad as umbrellas or piles of silk meringue.

The young boys, who eventually will become old boys to perpetuate this delightful tradition of more than a century of glistening summer afternoons, do the hard work in the shells. Every five minutes precisely throughout the day a race between two crews begins 2000 yards -the classic Henley distance-down the way from the enclosure. An umpire, with the commanding mien and voice of Horatio Nelson, stands in the bow of the committee boat, rasping: "Are you ready? Row!" And sending them off with a sweep of his scarlet flag.

With coxswains screaming and oars rattling and dipping, the skinny crafts depart, flashing their way past bored cattle and interested picnickers on the banks, and through wary families of ducks on the river itself. As the boats near the finish. the elegants and the commoners in the enclosures stir themselves from conversation and drinks and begin to cheer. Gently. In good taste, of course.

Although it does rise to an uncommonly boisterous level when the red and blacked tipped oars of Jesus College of Cambridge go by, everyone roaring: "Come on Jesus!"

This seems to please a dignified old evangelist in homburg and morning coat who carries a sign "Jesus only mighty to save" and paces along the river handing out religious tracts. If these colleges, Jesus of Cambridge and Christ of Oxford, reach the final of the Plate event, the cheering will seem straight out of a revival meeting rather than a clash of blueblood athletes.

Yet it: isn't all an upper class nostalgia orgy. Henley is also one of the last outposts of amateurism, a bash for workingmen who save up money and holidays to compete and kids like those from Lowell Tech in Massachusetts, which is not exactly a rowing citadel. The six

MIDDLETOWN - Tackle Bruce Valiant at 5-feet-11, 175, is the giant of the St. Andrew's School line

That should help explain the situation confronting new head coach Bob Colburn.

In addition to lacking size, the Cardinals lack experience, speed and a passer.

THIS showed up vividly in last Saturday's opener, a crushing 52-0 defeat at the hands of Episcopal Academy of Philadelphia's Interacademic League.

COLBURN, a graduate of Haverford College, inherited a team that lost 11 starters from last year's $4-3$ club. The only bonafide starters back are guard Brian Scripture ( 5 -feet-10, 165) and left halfback Tyrone Rice ( $5-11,160$ ). Center Jim Govatos (6-feet, 155) started occasionally.

Rice is again in the starting backfield, joined by quarterback Joe Moss ( $5-10,155$ ), right halfback Everett McNair (6-1, 180) and fullback Phil Mon (5-8, 145).

The starting offensive line has Mike Jones ( $6-1,160$ ) and

Dick Poole $(5-10,150)$ at end, Valliant and Andy Worthington-(5-9, 165), pushed by Coates Simon ( 5 -feet, 170) at tackle. Scripture and Gregg Kesterson (5-11, 165) at guard and Govatos at center.

Worthington, Scripture, Kesterson, Govatos, Rice. McNair and Hoo also start on defense. Other defensive starters include ends Ian Brownie ( 6 -feet, 165) and John Higgins (5-10, 150); and halfback Frank Elliott (5-11, 155).

Mike Berrigan, Kevin Nerlinger and Peter Logan look like the top runners in the Saints' backfield, although Lohnes hopes to have several players' split ball-carrying time equally
Co-captain Pat Dewer, an all conference selection on both offense and defense last season, is back. On defense he will still be a linebacker, while on offense he switches from
tackle to center. Dewar, along with the other co-captain Richard Corney, draws a fine review from Lohnes. "He's just so much stronger," says Lohnes of Dewar. His comments on Corney include, "I'll be surprised if he doesn't lead the team in interceptions.'
Capable linemen include 'Chuck Ramsey, Mike Lilley, Skelly Ingram, Mike Welch and Ashton Richards.
"The only thing we don't have is depth," says Lohnes. "Injuries could cripple us or slow us, so we have to hope that no one will get seriously hurt.'
Defensively, the Saints have been working on improving their pass rush, a weak point last season.
"We were embarrassed last year," says Lohnes. "And we don't want to be embarrassed again.
Points in the Saints favor: all three of

their conference games will be played at home (Oct. 15 vs. Friends, Oct. 29 vs. Tower Hill and Nov. 12 vs. Tatnall). And St. Andrew's has softened its eight-game schedule a bit
"We have a slightly weaker schedule this season," says Lohnes, pointing out that the Saints won't be playing Valley Forge or Archmere this season.

MIDDLETOWN - Robert Marshall Colburn will be making a comeback as head varsity football coach at St. Andrew's next fall. The 40-year-old native of Wellesley, Mass., a member of the St. Andrew's faculty 18 years, succeeds C. Daniel Lohnes Jr. as head coach and athletic director.
A physics and chemistry teacher the past term, Colburn skippered the Saints' football team to a 1-6 record in 1971, when he succeeded Webb Reyner. Colburn was succeeded in the top spot in 1972 by Dennis Madigan who, in turn, gave way to Lohnes in 1976.
Lohnes, a retired Air Force major, had a 2-6-1 season his first year at the private school and a 4-3-1 record last fall. He resigned to accept a position as head football coach and history teacher at Ransom Everglades School, Florida.
Colburn, a graduate of Haver ford College, will continue as head baseball coach, a position he has held 17 of his 18 years at St. Andrew's.
"I would have to say baseball is my first love, but I'm anxiously looking forward to football," said Colburn, who is the secretary of the Delaware Interscholastic Baseball Coaches Association. 'It's going to be quite a challenge this fall. We've graduated our entire interior line on offense as well as three of our starting backs, including "quarterback Andy McDowell."
Colburn said he plans no major changes. "I'Ll stick with the Wing T," he advised.
In other changes, the school's head wrestling coach, Jake Zeigler, who was head jayvee football coach last fall, has been promoted to the varsity as an assistant to Colburn, while Bill Carpenter succeeds Zeigler as head honcho of the jayvees. A new varsity assistant joining the staff in September will be Bob Grasso, a three-year inebacker at Cornell. Grasso will coach the line.

 Staff WriterMIDDLETOWN-Except for one season, Bob Colburn had been an assistant coach on St. Andrew's High School's football team for 17 years. This season, however, Colburn is head coach of the Saints, which should make him feel pretty good, right?

"Really, ít's no big deal," he said Monday, five days before the Saints' season opener with Rising Sun (Md.) at Middletown
"I was happy the way it.was, happy with the things I was doing. I really

wasn't looking for the head coaching job, but it is nice to have the opportunity."
Actually, Colburn gat the opportunity once before, in 1971. He coached the Saints that year, but went on a sabbatical the following year and was replaced by a new head coach. He said he knew the job was going to be a temporary one when he took it in 1971.
This year, though, there's no time limit on his new position with the team. He says he feels comfortable in his role because he's been at the school so long. But he has noticed a big difference from being an assistant.
"As head coach, I have all the responsibility. I make all the final decisions," he says. "All the responsibility for how the team does is on my shoulders. It also involves a lot more work, but I enjoy it very much.
"We always had a close staff at St. Andrews. We always did everything together, so I was involved in all the decisions anyway. But as head coach, there's much more pressure. I started feeling it last night when I was going over the plan for this week's game."
If things go as he expects, Colburn may be feeling quite a bit more pressure before the season ends. The Saints play a tough schedule and they'll have to do it with inexperienced athletes.
Eight starters from last season's offense are gone. The same number of defensive starters from last year's 4-3-1 team are no longer on the squad. "It's
going to be hard to replace all of them," Colburn says. "We're going to be pretty green."
So, rather than set his sights on an unattainable goal, like an undefeated season, Colburn has set a simpler goal for himself. He's approaching his new job from a teaching standpoint. He feels if his players improve, both on the field and as individuals, he will have had a successful season.
'Of course, we'd like to have a good record, too, if that's possibie," he says. "After all, nobody has beaten us yet so I guess you could say we're unbeaten. You never know what will happen during the season."
If it sounds like Colburn has already caught that disease, optimism, that seems to afflict all head coaches, he hasn't. "To be realistic," he says, "our chances of making the playoffs are very slim. We really havn't got much chance. It would be just short of a miracle if we did."
If he does come up with that miracle, it would probably be due, in part, to the play of three of his returning athletes. Co-captain Mike Lilley, an allconference defensive back last season, returns as a safety and receiver this year. Mike Berrigan, the other cocaptain, will be at fullback. Chuck Ramsey will put his 6 -foot-4 frame to good use as both an offensive and defensive end.
"After those three, everybody's new," Colburn says.
"We've only had two weeks of practice so iar, but the kids have worked hard and made good improvement. My coaches and I tell them that they have to play way over their heads all the time if they want to have a good season. If they do that, I think we can surprise some people."

"All through the week we've been getting calls from Archmere, inquiring about our injured players. The other day, a couple Archmere administrators called. Archmere showed us a lot of class.
"Even in the game Archmere showed compassion, using subs through the second half after taking a $30-0$ halftime lead."

Yes, St. Andrew's took its lumps Saturday, but in defeat it learned there are more important things in life than the final score of a football game.

# Tower Hill scores 10-0 win, stays unbeaten in conference

MIDDLETOWN - "Keep him in the park," known to most as baseball lingo, could have applied to Tower Hill School's talented running back Ty Roberts in its game with St. Andrew's here yesterday.
St. Andrew's did just that; holding Roberts from breaking any long runs. In fact, his longest run of the day was a 15 -yarder but Tower Hill still managed to defeat St. Andrew's $10-0$ to remain unbeaten in the Independent Conference and stay on a collision course with Friends for the conference championship.
"Roberts didn't break any long ones but in that last drive he was getting four yards on every play," said St. Andrew's Coach Bob Col-
bourn. "We slowed him down a bit but didn't stop him."
The state's leading scorer with 83 points gained 126 yards on 21 carries and scored the only touchdown of what was a surprisingly close contest.
The Hillers' touchdown came with only four minutes left in the game after they had stopped a St. Andrew's drive inside their own 15. From there, Tower Hill quarterback Vince DiRienzo took his team 89 yards, all on the ground to score
Roberts got 39 of those yards before culminating the drive with a one-yard scoring plunge
"The other teams try to key on him and Ty never really got going until that drive but in that situation you have to go with your money back and everything did go in that drive," said DiRienzo.
"I guess we were a little flat coming off the big win against Laurel last week, but at the half we knew St. Andrew's was pretty tough and had to play good football to win."
The Hillers' got on the scoreboard in the first half when Carl Storlazzi kicked a 31-yard field goal. It was the first time he had attempted a field goal this season and had only kicked one extra-point all year.
"I felt pretty good getting on the scoreboard before the half ended," said Tower Hill Coach Steve Hyde. "I'm disappointed but not surprised in our game today. We came off two big wins and had a poor practice week but you have to give St. Andrew's credit, they played us off our feet."
Statisically, the Hillers dominated, rushing for 231 yards compared to the Saints' 32 and picked up 18 first downs to St. Andrew's seven.
"I'm very proud of my kids," said Colbourn. "Tower Hill beat Archmere and they killed us. Our team gave 100 percent out there but Tower Hill really earned it on that last scoring drive."

## Bill Billings 'backs' into Middletown win

Three things have been synono mous with football at Middletown High since Coach Bill Billings arrived on the scene in 1962: winning games, excellent running backs and unorthodox plays.
These trademarks of Cavalier teams in the past 17 years all were evident in Middletown's $26-8$ victo ry over Archmere in the Delaware High School Football Tournamen Division II title game yesterday.
Never one to be conventional, Billings' coaching methods have been criticized and laughed at over the years, but his record of Under Billings, Midd
Under Billings, Middletown put together a 53 -game winning streak between 1962 and 1967 . That streak "David versus Goliath" game in 1966 when the Cavaliers beat Salesianum 14-13. Yesterday's triumph however, brought Middletown its first state championship. "You can never win enough; once I get tired of wiming Ill give up coaching," said Billings. "The highlight of my coaching career was the Salesianum win, but this was a big thrill today. Anytime ou win it's a thrill. A major ingredient of the Middetown success story has always
been its backfield. Billings has been its backfield. Billings has coached 10 first-team All-State been some of the best backs in this state's scholastic football history.
In the early years of the Billings' era, standout Middletown backs ncluded Gary Simendinger, Clarence Saunders and Sonny Merkel. More recently, Scotty Reihm and Joe Todd have been headlines as outstanding Cavalier backs. If the performance of juniors George Jackson and Dwayne Henry are
any indication, they should join the list of top Middletown backs. Billings had a simple explana tion for the success of his Middletown backs. "I guess two fast people got together and had a lot of offspring," he joked.
It was the balance of the Middletown backfield yesterday that was the key to victory. While Archmere had to rely mainly on Mark DiNardo, who broke the Division II record for most with 151 five Cavaliers backs contributed
But it wa
But it was the running of most. Jackson carried nine times for 144 yards and scored two touchdowns. He also set the record for the longest run from scrimmage with a 69-yarder.
"Nobody knew about Jackson except me; most of the time we run to our left and Jackson is the blocking back, but when we run to he right lke ", did ings.

"This week has been like a dream come true," said the 6 -foot 190-pound DiNardo. "I never went out and said 'I'm gonna be AllState,' though it would have been nice, I consider myself the luckiest guy around and I have a lot of people to thank.
Perhaps the luckiest aspect of iNardo's career, which includes finishing runnerup the last three
years in the playoffs, is that it has been an injury-free one. Over three years, he has carried the ball 587 times without missing a game. And the sure-handed senior fumbled only once during that span.
"I remember when we played Sun Valley (Pa.)," he said. "' think I ran nine straight times right, left, right, left. I turned to Kevin Lagasse in the huddle and said 'Do you see there's a pattern want it any other way."

DiNardo led the state in scoring during the regular season with 19 touchdowns and 126 points. He added two TDs in the playoffs and rashed for 1,427 yards on 256 carries.

## Both St. Mark's and Middletown have history of success

In St. Mark's and Middletown, Delaware has two state football champions whose names are synonymous with football success.
They are radically different schools. St. Mark's, which opened in 1969 and graduated its first class in 1973, has lived up to the Diocese of Wilmington's hopes for the school, the plans for which were announced in 1966.
St. Mark's was to be one of the strongest academic schools in the area, which it is. Its full coeducation heralded a change in Catholic secondary education in Delaware. Its second girls basketball captain was a Presidential scholar, and the school attracts academic reçruiters as much as football recruiters.
"St. Mark's is something special. It
stands out from the rest of the schools. We have a pretty good reputation around Washington, Pennsyl vania and Maryland. When we go there to play, we feel like we represent the state," says Frank Cephous, the Spartans' star running back and inebacker.
Middletown is unique as well. It is the only downstate town and school in a New Castle County that otherwise revolves around Wilmington. Only Middletown, which integrated its schools in 1966, was excluded from the county-wide busing order. Several times, its former State Senator, J. Donald Isaacs, tried to amend the State Consititution to move Middletown to Kent County
"We get good support from the people in our town. They got together the money to put us up at the hotel last night," says tackle Danny Keel-

Middletown is the only Blue Hen Conference school that plays its games on Friday night.
Both schools have been the victims of blackballing by being too good.
The Diamond State Conference kicked out Middletown in the most effective way imaginable: by dissolving in 1969, then applying for admission to the Henlopen Conference, whose bylaws restricted membership to "public schools in Kent and Sussex County."
The Blue Hen Conference used to play St. Mark's, as athletic directors like the large and well-behaved, if success-spoiled, crowds that follow St. Mark's.
But when St. Mark's beat 15 straight Blue Hen teams, 1973-75, then everyone but Wilmington High dropped the Spartans from their schedule.

You can understand the public schools' paranoia, when you hear members of the 1978 Division One title team explain why they went to St. Mark's.
"My family lived in England until I was in ninth grade. When we moved here, I could have gone to McKean or St. Mark's, I never played football before - I played rugby over there - but I wanted to play foutball. I knew their reputation," said guard Wayne MacMasters
Pat Hare has wanted to play for St. Mark's since he was in grade school. Hare, a junior, and the current senior class were making their high school choices when St.Mark's was winning consecutive state titles in 1973 and 1974.
The Spartans' coach, Don Burawski , was an all-state lineman at Salesianum in the late 1950s, played for 1960 Big Ten titlist and regular-sea-
son national champion Minnesot then transferred to Delaware, wher he learned the Wing-T he teaches After three years as basketball hea coach and football assistant to Jin Garvin at Tatnall, he became S Mark's first football coach.
'He's the nicest guy to play for. H supports you. It's nice to hear that hi coaches a winning team now," sair Dave Schutzman, who played fo Burawski's talent-thin Tatnall teams
The Spartans had their worst sea son ever last year, 4-4-1, though thi year's $10-2$ record brings the Spal tans up to $58-25-1$ overall.

## St. Andrew's gets off to a late start

MIDDLETOWN-Every year it's the same.
They start practice late. They start the season late. More often than not, they start winning late.
Everyone else gets a head start and then the Saints of St. Andrew's School start to play football.
Nothing's changed this season.
But what has changed is the nature of the 200 -student private school's football program, or so second-year head coach Bob Colburn says.
Suddenly he has players, 55 of them compared to the 30 or so that played a couple of years ago.
And suddenly the Saints have football players, not the dozens of ex-soccer players who've populated the Saints' roster in years past.
"One of the things we found in past years was the schools we drew (students) from tended to have soccer programs in their elementary systems rather than football programs," Colburn says. "We tended to pick up more soccer players."
And 22 field goal kickers does not a football team make.
St. Andrew's has recently expanded its overall admissions program, CoIburn says, drawing students from different schools, some of which have solid football programs at the elementary level.

## Saints' schedule

"We weren't satisfied overall," Colburn says. "We were very satisfied after losing our first four games by big scores."
Personnel problems could also con-
tribute to the annual slow start. Colburn is looking for a quarterback and after three weeks of preseason practice, he's still looking. Sophomores Bob Williford and Jeff Lilley, plus freshman Dan Garrison are the candidates.
Co-captains Ned Orth and Bryant Davies are experienced running backs who'll share the load and it could be a heavy load behind a rather smallish line. Hank Jacoby, at 206 pounds, is the biggest lineman, although 6 -foot-4, 195pound Chuck Ramsey could contribute at end.
On defense, the names are the same. Orth and Davies will be among the linebackers and Williford and Jacoby could be on the line. Mike Lehnartz, the Saints' 155 -pound offensive center, will also play somewhere on defense.
"I hate to say it at this point of the season, but we're still not sure where people will play," Colburn says. "The problem is we get ourselves into a bind and we have to make a decision."
One thing Colburn is encouraged about is youth-his team has a lot of it. The new players are young, freshmen, sophomores and even an eighth-grader or two. That could mean a good future.
"A lot of these kids are young, eighth and ninth, some of them 10th graders," Colburn says. "It's encouraging to have young kids that we'll be able to bring along.'
It's just that at St. Andrew's, it just comes along a little later than everyone else.

and a 1-6-1 record, Len Dwinell is out. He decided to join his father in farming in Massachusetts. And Frank Pergolizzi, a 24 -year-old native of Queens, N.Y., is in.
This is the third head-coaching change at the Independent Conference school in the last four years.
Pergolizzi comes in with some impressive credentials. He was a four-year warsity performer (linebacker and guard) at Flushing High, N.Y., a linebacker and end at Williams College, head coach for two years at Hebron Academy in Maine and last fall he was the defensive coordinator for the freshman team at Cornell University.
But Pergolizzi will soon discover that coaching at St. Andrew's, where victories in recent years have been harder to come by than a box seat for the seventh game of a World Series, is unlike other places he has coached.
"I'm aware of that," he conceded. "This summer I must've spent 45-50 hours reviewing the school's game films of last year, in addition to writing a playbook."
And, as a movie critic, what did Pergolizzi discover?
"The strategy used last year was, so to speak, all wrong," he said. "They tried power-oriented stuff when they didn't have poweroriented kids to do the job. The kids need to be thoroughly re-coached in all fundamentals of the game.
"Part of the emphasis this year will be on passing. We'll definitely pass more than in the past.
IT'm continuing with the 'I,' but with much different emphasis. And on defense, we'll go with 4-4, as opposed to last year's 5-2."
Pergolizzi has five starters back on defense and four on offense. He's stillevaluating the talent.
"We may have a couple of players going both ways, but I try to avoid this."
Showing he means business, he scheduled three-a-day drills from Sept. 5 to Sept. 8, then switched to two-a-day.

He said he was pleased with the turnout of candidates. "We had 45 kids out when we started. That's not bad for a school that has only 160 boys.".
He has five assistants, including holdovers Bob Colburn, former head coach and now athletic director and baseball coach, and Bill Carpenter. Colburn is defensive coordinator and works with secondary people. Carpenter, who'll be the head jayvee coach, handles receivers.
The coaching staff newcomers are Purdue grad Tom Odden, line coach; former Middletown High freshman coach Wyman Rodgers, assistant with the line and jayvees; and Frankie Sumpter, a sub teacher in the Christiana School District, offensive backs, Sumpter, once affiliated with Cecil Community College, had a stint with the Washington Redskins.
Pergolizzi can thank athletic director Colburn for scheduling a late opening this season (Saturday vs. Morristown Beard). It gives him that much-needed additional time to get acquainted with his Saints and it gives them time to adapt to his new system of play.
Pergolizzi said he first learned about the coaching vacancy at St. Andrew's through an educational placement service. He and his wife, Leanne, live on campus.
If Pergolizzi is able to instantly turn around the sagging football fortunes at St. Andrew's, the school may rename Noxontown Pond in his honor.

## Colburn takes reins of St. A's football

MIDDLETOWN - For the third time in his 24 -year career at St. Andrew's School, Bob Colburn is taking over the reins as head football coach.

The native of Wellesley, Mass., and graduate of Haverford (Pa.) College, succeeds Frank Pergolizzi, who resigned to accept a position as defensive line coach at Elmhurst (Ill.) College.
Pergolizzi posted a 2-6 record in 1981 and 2-7 in 1982.
In his previous stabs as head coach, Colburn was 1-6 in 1971, 3-5 in 1978 and 17 in 1979. When he wasn't the head coach, Colburn served as an assistant for all but two of his years at the private school.

St. Andrew's hasn't had a winning season since 1977, when Coach Dan Lohnes recorded a 4-3-1 log

Colburn, who's also the school's athletic director, head baseball coach and a fulltime chemistry teacher, said he's taking over the head job because it's important at this late date to have someone at the helm who totally understands the situation at St. Andrew's.
"I have plenty to do without this job, but I want to see St. Andrew's regain the football respectability it had in the '60s," said Colburn. "That's a pet project of mine.
"We've been down in football the last several years and it's important to have someone from the inside take over, someone who
understands what is going on. It's difficult for a new person to come right in and pick that up.
"We're an acadernic institution. Football is secondary. I admire our kids who have taken beatings on the football field but always kept coming up, never giving up. We need someone who understands that."
Colburn will be trying to rebuild the football program with one less coach than Pergolizzi had last year. Colburn replaced Pergolizzi but there will be no replacement for departing aide Phil Jacobs.

Colburn will handle the coaching with returning aides Tom Odden (line coach) and Bill Carpenter (jayvee coach).

Practice starts Sept. 1. After a scrimmage with Ferris Sept. 9, St. Andrew's will open a nine-game schedule Sept. 17 at home against Howard Career Center, a first-time opponent.

"Of course, it looks a little different than the one I've got on. It's got old cloth with the stars sewn on. I could probably get away with wearing it, though."
Though Ken Simpler Jr. is playing with the same jersey number in the same All-Star Game, he is not representing the same school his dad represented in '62. The elder Simpler, owner of the popular Avenue Restaurant in Rehoboth Beach, played his football for old Rehoboth High.
Though Ken Jr. grew up in the Rehoboth area, spending many a summer washing dishes and busing tables at his family's busy restaurant, he never attended any area public schools
"I went to a country school in Berlin, Md., then up to St. Andrew's [located in Middletown] for high school," he said. "My parents left the decision up to me as to whether I should go to St. Andrew's, but I loved the place when I saw it. The campus is nice and it's a fine school academically."
Simpler certainly took advantage of the latter quality. He finished second in this year's St. Andrew's graduating class while gaining summa cum laude honors, scored an impressive 1,350 on his college boards, and was accepted on early action to Princeton University
"I'm thinking of entering premed," he said.

Simpler gave no indication that he'd like to enter the restaurant business. In 1944 the Simpler family first opened the Avenue Restaurant, which is located on Rehoboth Ave., one block from the boardwalk. The Simplers sold the business in 1950 before buying it back in 1959.
"I started at the bottom in that place when I was a kid," said Simpler. "You name it and I've done it in there. I've even done some cooking, though I never really excelled at it. I guess I can do it if I have to, though."
Ken Sr., 40 , gave a hint as to why his 1962 All-Star jersey may still be in such great shape.
"I didn't see a whole lot of action in that game," recalled Simpler from his Rehoboth home. "I can't even remember what position I played."
His son, a 6 -foot-1, 180 -pound fullback, plans on seeing a lot more playing time on Saturday. Kickoff is 2 p.m. and proceeds will benefit the Delaware Foundation for Retarded Children.

Simpler was St. Andrew's team captain last fall, and he's just the type who could help lead the Gold charge.
"The past two years, football has sort of been on a recovery at our school," said Coach Bob Colburn of St. Andrew's. "We were 0-9 the year before last and 3-6 last year, but we could easily have been $5-4$. We lost twice in the final seconds. Our kids have begun to regain a strong attitude for football and a lot of that has to do with Kenny's leadership. We'll be stronger next year as a result of what he and the other seniors accomplished.'

With six players making the first team, including 6 -foot-4, 251 -pound Lineman of the Year Tom Bockius, unbeaten two-year Division I state champion Newark High highlights the 1985 Delaware Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association AllState:football team.
The All-State team selection was based on state head coaches' votes and interviews and DSBA member input.

Also gaining first-team honors from Newark are quarterback Donny Wright, running back Kenny Chandler, offensive end Derrick May, defensive lineman Kevin O'Hara, and linebacker Mike Reeder.
Delmar, the unbeaten Division II state champion, places two players on first team, nose man and Defensive Player of the Year Andy Harris and defensive back Nate Gaines.
Mike Benefield, St. Mark's 5-9, 190-pound workhorse tailback who rushed for 1,553 yards, was a nearunanimous choice as a first-team running back and receives Offensive Player of the Year honors.

Following is a highlight of each first team player:
Mike Benefield - Opponents had to gangtackle this $5-9,190$-pound bowling ball every time. Possessing a great combination of strength ( 400 -pound bench press) and speed (4.5 40-yard dash), Benefield was the state's most fearsome runner, averaging 7.0 yards per carry.
"Benny had the ability to dominate a game," said St. Mark's Coach Jack Smiley. "There aren't too many who come along like him."
Benefield, Salesianum first-team All-State defensive end Mark Kostic and second-team linebacker

Harry Schiavi were tri-winners of the Michael DeLucia Memorial Sportsmanship Award, presented each year to a Catholic school football player who best exhibits sportsmanship and dedication.

Virginia Tech, Syracuse, Penn State and West Virginia have shown interest in Benefield.

Andy Harris - A first-team AllState defensive end last year, Harris started this year at middle linebacker, but was so valuable Coach Greg Wood moved him to nose guard after one game. Also a standout offensive tackle and occasional center, he recorded 108 first tackles, 12 assists and two sacks.

Harris has been the foundation of the Delmar defense since his sophomore season. Delmar has gone 25 -6-1 during those three years.

Harris, at 6-1, 235 pounds, is being strongly recruited by Temple. Delaware is also interested.
Tom Bockius - A first-team AllStater last year on offense, Bockius - a dominating player on either side - makes first team both ways this time.

An honor roll student ( 3.5 average), Bockius has received heavy interest from some Ivy League schools and several Division I-A programs, including West Virginia.
"The biggest compliment you can give Tom is that he hustled on every play," said Coach Butch Simpson. "He went from side to side, and you'd often see him way downfield blocking."

Donny Wright - One of two juniors to make first team, the 6-4 quarterback completed 85 of 152 passes for 1,351 yards and 19 touchdowns.
Also a threat on the ground, he ran for touchdowns of 47 and 17 yards in Newark's $25-10$ Division I state title win over Glasgow.
Kenny Chandler - One of the top

running backs in Newark history, he rushed for 1,342 yards and 18 touchdowns while making 22 receptions for 302. yards and four TDs. Voted team most valuable player, Chandler played most of the season with a painful knee cartilage tear.
Rob Buccini - A first-team AllState running back last year with 1,100 yards for Division II state champ Friends, Buccini enjoyed an even better year this fall $(1,313$ yards, 228 carries, 5.75 yards average) despite Friends' numerous graduation losses and a rare virus that attacked the lining of his heart.
"For four weeks at the end of the summer, Rob couldn't take part in any physical activity," said Coach Bob Tattersall. "He had to go to the University of Pennsylvania for special tests and he lost some weight and strength. We weren't sure if he'd be able to play this fall. But he had an incredible year. In the time I've been here [ 18 years] Rob came as close to carrying us as a team as anyone we've had.
Buccini is a 3,500-yard career varsity rusher. An honor student, he is interested in several Ivy League schools.
Lionel Dixon - Rushed for 1,209 yards. Only 5-7, 150 but runs hard, bench presses 285 pounds and has incredible explosiveness through the line.
"Lionel may, not be the fastest running back in the state, but he is awfully quick," said Lake Forest Coach Jim Fleming. "I haven't seen a running back faster for the first 10 yards."
Brian Kotz - Called "the best place-kicker in my 26 years at St. Andrew's" by Coach Bob Colburn. A resident of Charles Town, W. Va. Kotz becomes the first St. Andrew's first-team All-State football player since Tom Stephens in 1969. This fall Kotz kicked field goals of 43,42 , 39,33 and 30 yards, and successfully booted 15 of 16 extra point attempts. In his three-year varsity career, Kotz made 33 of 37 extra points and kicked 10 field goals. Career scoring: 63 points. A 4.0 average honor student, he is interested in Duke, Harvard, Princeton, and Yale.
Chris Story - Claymont's versatile end who also lined up in the backfield. Story caught 34 passes for 386 yards, four touchdowns and two extra points despite being dou-ble-teamed most of the time Rushed 52 times for 256 yards and five TDs, and completed 3 of 8 passes for 76 yards and two TDs.
Derrick May - Newark's 6-4 208 -pounder (runs the 40 in 4.5 ) who caught 40 passes for 784 yards and 12 TDs, including two to help beat Glasgow in the Division I state title game. May has received heavy interest so far from Maryland, Virginia Tech and UCLA. Equally adept as a baseball center fielder, May will likely be selected in next June's major-league free agent draft.

James Baustert - Caught 33 passes for 496 yards (15-yard average) and four touchdowns for Dover. Baustert's trademark was his super catches. His sensational 42-yard reception set up the winning touchdown in a 21-7 comeback victory oyer Sussex Central. He had a similar diving catch for a 40 -yard

touchdown against Wicomico.
Scott Fleming - Aside from Bockius, the only player to make All-State both ways, as a Lake Forest guard and linebacker. His father is Jim Fleming, Lake's coach. A three-year starter at linebacker, Fleming this year had 46 unassisted tackles, 105 assists, and three interceptions. He also knocked down two passes, blocked three extra point kicks and one field goal.
Scott Smart - Seaford's top interior lineman. The Jays loved to run guard traps with fullback Herbert Ricketts, and Smart was the key blocker. Ricketts gained more than 1,100 yards each of the last two seasons.
"When we rotated our guards early in the year Scott stayed on the field all the time," said Coach Ron Dickerson.

Keith Truitt - The state's best center, Glasgow's Truitt took on the finest nose men around and always held his own. Younger brother of Glasgow 1981 All-Stater Mike Truitt. Also a stellar defensive lineman.

Mike Flanagan - A major college recruit at 6-5, 260 pounds, offensive tackle Flanagan has received 45 football scholarship offers, including ones from Ohio State, Notre Dame, Penn State, Boston College and North Carolina. The Woodstown, N.J., resident will go down as one of Salesianum's finest linemen ever.

Erick Warren - A monstrous 6-4, 280 pounds, Lake Forest's Warren had 37 solo tackles, assisted on 81 and made 15 sacks.
"Erick is so big that he automatically creates a problem inside on

## Bunting leads attack; Harris heads defense

- Crispin wins Blue-Gold Rush 5K, D4
- Gold dominates line play, D8

The powerful Gold team played to its potential in all phases of the game and rolled to an impressive 39-13 victory over the outmanned Blue in the 31st annual Blue-Gold High School All-Star Football Game Saturday afternoon before an announced crowd of 10,357 at Delaware Stadium.
The Gold, led by quarterback Clinton Bunting of Indian River, had too much size and talent for the smaller Blue squad, rolling up 221 yards rushing on 50 attempts and 166 more passing.

Proceeds from Saturday's game benefit the more than 18,000 mentally retarded citizens of Delaware. The Blue still leads the series $18-11$ with two ties.

Bunting was named the winner of the Michael K. Webb Outstanding Player Award, presented by the Notre Dame Club of Delaware, after completing four of five passes for 89 yards and directing the Gold on four of its six touchdown drives.
' "The Blue had been teasing us in practice this week that we were 40 -point favorites and they were going to get us," said Bunting. "We had to show them today. We had tremendous size and talent, but sometimes a team's heart gets you to the top. It was hard to stop today."

Bunting's most spectacular play came late in the third quarter after Blue quarterback Jamie Frost threw a 19 -yard touchdown pass to Mike Williams, cutting the Gold lead to 27-7.

After the Blue just missed gaining possession on an onside kick, Bunting serambled away from a rush on third-and-eight to complete a 44 -yard pass to Seaford's Tony Alston at the Blue 3. On the next play, All-State tailback Mike Benefield of St. Mark's scored and the Gold was in command 33-7.
Scott Smith of Middletown split time with Bunting at quarterback, hitting all three of his passes for 77 yards.

The two quarterbacks combined to complete seven of eight passes, setting a game record for completion percentage.

Middle guard Andy Harris of Delmar triggered a ferocious Gold defense and won the Outstanding Lineman Award, given by the Newark Touchdown Club. he Blue managed only 58 yards rushing and quarter-

backs Frost, John Pierce and Rich Miles spent a great deal of the afternoon trying to escape from Harris.
"It was tough for the Blue to get into its game plan when Andy Harris was tackling the quarterback after he took two steps," said Gold Coach Robbie Schroeder of Cape Henlopen. "All of the recognition Andy has received to this point is certainly well deserved. He was such a big key for us today."
The Gold kept the Blue off balance with a variety of plays from its I-formation, including two short touchdown runs by Erick Warren, a 6 -foot-4, 295 -pound defensive tackle from Lake Forest.

Warren, taking a page from Chicago Bears star William Perry, lined up in the backfield at fullback and scored on a pair of 2-yard runs that gave the Gold a 27-0 lead in the third quarter.
"Bunting and Smith threw the ball well and the Gold simply had a big, strong and talented football team today," said Blue Coach George Kosanovich of Concord. "Our big hope today was to try and hang in there until we could get a few turnovers that might make a difference in the game. That just didn't happen.
"Our kids worked as hard as they could, but when you are up against kids 40 and 50 pounds bigger who are also working as hard as they can, it gets pretty tough. The Gold got off the ball so well today. They had all the talent and the tools."
The Gold wasted little time establishing that control, scoring on three of its four possessions in the first half to take a 21-0 lead at intermission. The one possession the Gold did not score on, halfback Ken Chandler of Newark fumbled the ball away at the Blue 29 after an 11-yard gain in the second quarter.

Bunting had two big pass plays of 16 yards each to Alston and Scott Dyer on the drive.

The winning team's of fensive line helped color Saturday's Blue-Gold All-Star High School Football Game black and blue.

Another remnant of the 1960 s completed its what-goes-around-comes-around cycle Saturday afternoon in the form of a St. Andrew's School football victory over Friends.
The last one was a generation ago, in 1969. And even if most of the present St. Andrew's players weren't even born then, their sense of history, especially recent history, was keen enough to appreciate a 26-7 victory on Friends' home field.
"They've kicked us pretty bad the last four years," said middle linebacker/running back J.C. Branner.


## St. Andrew's crushes Friends

"When I was a freshman, they beat us 49-0.
"We know we're good, it's just a matter of proving it and this was the week to do it because Friends is a good football team. And we knew if we could beat them it would make or break our season."
The victory in their Independent Conference opener gave the Saints a 3-1 overall record while Friends dropped to 0-1, 2-2.
Richard Snyder, a 5 -foot-11, 170pound senior fullback, rushed 18 times for 103 yards and three St. Andrew's touchdowns.
The only touchdown Snyder didn't score was the second, a 22 -yard sweep around the left side by Jeff Trabaudo that put the Saints ahead 13-0 with 5 minutes, 16 seconds left in the first half.
Snyder had scored on a 2-yard run just 25 seconds before Trabaudo, six plays after Jason Gardner had leaped high for an interception. But Friends fullback Alan McDonald fumbled the football right back to St. Andrew's on first down.
And though Friends retaliated with a 9 -play, 81 -yard scoring march of its own before halftime indicating the Quakers would get back into the game, it turned out to be a false alarm.
"Our first three games, we had flashes of brilliance - good half, good quarter," said John Lyons, in his first year as St. Andrew's head coach after one year as an assistant under Bob Colburn, who's still on the staff. "Today we finally put it together. And Friends really means something to these guys."

A 15-season drought - high-
lighted by a $0-0$ tie in 1977 - is the reason.
"The fullback, Snyder, did a great job," said Lyons. "He was just fabulous. And the defense? You can't say enough. They were just wild."
"I think we were flat today," said Friends Coach Bob Tattersall. "St. Andrew's played extremely well but I think, with our inexperience, staying up for three weeks [after two straight wins] was difficult. And our defense didn't play well at all."
McDonald recovered a Trabaudo fumble to give Friends possession at the St. Andrew's 48 for their first series of the third quarter. But the Quakers' drive stalled at the 11, where quarterback Erik Opderbeck, whose 9 -yard option run gave Friends its first six points, threw incomplete on fourth-and-11.
The Saints, using Jason Gardner and Tim Dunn at quarterback, motored right down the field, with Snyder eating up 18 - and 10 -yard chunks on two runs and catching a third-down pass for 13 yards. His 3 -yard burst through the left side increased the score to 19-7. and only made St. Andrew's hungry for more.
A bad snap that rolled through Friends punter Tom Dipple's legs gave St. Andrew's possession at the Friends' 2 with less than 10 minutes to go. Snyder carried for the last TD on the very next play.
"The kids have been growing for two years now," said Lyons. "Four years ago they were $0-9$, two years ago 3-6 and last year 5-3. They really have done a great job. And a lot of those kids who've been working all along are now seniors."
