No-Hitter

Larry Court Up To Old Tricks

Larry Court's no-hit game against Friend's was a thing of beauty to behold. Though Larry has thrown no-hitters before—three as a junior varsity hurler and one last year against Smyrna—this year's no-hitter is the one he will remember the longest. Court has never thrown a better or more perfect game in a Saint uniform, and it is doubtful he ever will. After the game was over, all our hero could say is that the near perfect game was "sweet revenge" over a tough rival.

The game started as any other. Friend's leadoff batter, John Harris, hit weakly back to the box. Larry

then walked Speakman (the only opponent to reach base) on a disputed fourth ball and promptly picked him off. He ended the inning by getting Lindley to pop up to the mound. In the second, Lar struck out Brown and Cox before getting Hess to ground to Buckaloo at shortstop. All three third inning batters, Sparks, Kenworth, and Dagliesh, were retired on strikes. With the top of the order up in the fourth, Lar came through beautifully. He got Harris to ground weakly to the mound again, struck out Speakman and got Lindley on a grounder to Thompson at first. In the fifth, Brown and Cox struck out before Hess grounded to Court. Morris led off the sixth by grounding to second baseman Pratchett, and then Larry struck out Kenworthy and Bishop. Court finished up in the seventh in fine style, getting Popejoy to ground to the mount and striking out Speakman and consistently tough hitter Lindley.

Court seemed to get stronger as the game went along, pitching fewer pitches in each succeeding inning with the exception of the second. He ended the game with only eighty pitches thrown (an average of a little more than eleven an inning) and twelve big strikeouts.
